You got it wrong. Testing doesn't improve achievement.

If it were that simple, Louisiana's massive testing program would have put us at the top years ago; but, we remain at the bottom.

In this state, there are two kinds of public high schools: the selective schools that are allowed to kick out students who are failing, and the other schools that teach both the "kicked out" students together with all other students rejected by the selective schools.

The latter schools —those that serve the most difficult-toteach students —have greater challenges yet receive the same resources. It is this inequity, not the lack of a stricter testing rule, that causes failure.
